Hilton Head PSD won a WaterSense award!

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has recognized the PSD with a WaterSense Excellence Award for Education and Outreach.

wastewater a year. Recycled water is used to nourish wetlands in Palmetto Hall and the Whooping Crane Pond and Cypress Conservancies in Hilton Head Plantation. The PSD was recently recognized by the EPA's WaterSense Program for education and outreach regarding local water efficiency.

Hilton Head Public Service District (PSD) has earned the 2020 Excellence in Education and Outreach Award from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's WaterSense program. The PSD earned the award for its efforts to inform and educate customers about water efficiency and environmental sustainability programs.

"Hilton Head PSD has done a great job of amplifying WaterSense campaigns with interesting and engaging messages to reach their customers," said Veronica Blette, head of the EPA WaterSense program. "And customers should be proud of how PSD is leveraging other partners like the Clemson Cooperative Extension to develop materials that benefit the community."

The PSD actively promotes Clemson University Cooperative Extension's "Carolina Yards" program, which teaches sustainable landscape management practices. It also informs customers about the local irrigation and rain-sensor ordinance on Hilton Head Island that restricts irrigation to no more than two days a week at all times and requires working rain sensors on all irrigation systems.

"Our customers play a pivotal role in helping to save our most precious natural resource — water," said PSD General Manager Pete Nardi. "Earning this national recognition from the EPA shows the importance that our entire island places on natural resource stewardship and environmental protection."





Annual water main flushing program scheduled for later this month

Beaufort-Jasper Water and Sewer Authority (BJWSA), Hilton Head Public Service District (HHPSD) and Broad Creek Public Service District (BCPSD) will temporarily change the drinking water treatment method and flush water lines throughout their service areas for a two-week period starting October 29. The change is part of the routine maintenance program for the utilities' water distribution systems. There will be no interruption in service as a result of the work.

Customers can use their water as normal, but may notice a slight chlorine taste or odor in the tap water beginning Thursday, October 29 through Friday, November 13. Customers in some areas may notice brief discoloration in the tap water as a result of lines being flushed. If water appears discolored, customers should run cold water for a few minutes. If discoloration persists, BJWSA customers can call (843) 987-9200, Hilton Head PSD customers can call (843) 681-5525 and for Broad Creek PSD, customers can call (843) 785-7582.

In addition, the following wholesale customers will be affected: Callawassie, Moss Creek (Water Oak Utilities), Harbor Island, Fripp Island and the military facilities. Contact your designated utility with any questions.

Customers who are especially sensitive to the taste and odor of chlorine can keep an open container of drinking water in their refrigerators. This will reduce the chlorine taste. Water stored in refrigerated containers should be changed weekly.

Important Water Safety Tips for Reopening Schools and Businesses

As re-openings of schools and businesses occur in South Carolina, the PSD would like to provide the following guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention



(CDC) because safely restarting water use in an unused or underused building requires several preventative steps. COVID-19 has not been detected in any public drinking water because current water treatment methods remove or inactivate the virus that causes COVID-19.

Schools and businesses, including churches, still need to make sure their building's water system is safe to use. Stagnant or standing water in

unused or underused buildings can increase the risk for growth and spread of other biofilm-associated bacteria. Stagnant water can also lead to low or undetectable levels of disinfectants, such as chlorine. If you have buildings that have been sitting idle for an extended period with little or no water use, water in the building lines and piping can become stagnant and needs to be flushed from the lines.

For most schools and businesses, some common steps can be taken to return their buildings to service. When a school or business is being returned to service, please ensure that the private plumbing system is working properly, leaks are minimized, wastewater piping is intact, and most importantly the building's plumbing is flushed. A thorough flushing process is necessary to ensure that all the water inside the building piping is filled with fresh water.

And remember: Even during those random heat waves we'll see throughout the late fall and winter, local ordinance still limits water use for irrigation to twice a week.
