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It's peak hurricane season. The 2020 Atlantic hurricane season is setting records. Stay prepared.



It's been an extremely busy hurricane season so far in 2020. As of September 14, the Atlantic had already seen 20 named storms — only one storm away from using all 21 alphabetical names for the season. If the season brings more than one more storm, the National Hurricane Center will switch to the Greek alphabet. The only other season that's used the Greek alphabet was 2005, the year of Hurricane Katrina.

With such an unprecedented hurricane season upon us, it's more important than ever to stay prepared. We still have two and a half months left of the official 2020 Atlantic hurricane season, which runs through November 30.

So keep those hurricane kits stocked, and make sure your family has a plan.

If a hurricane does impact Hilton Head Island this season, remember to follow all public advisories related to utility service and hurricanes — and do not expect to have utility services available during and after a storm.

If a mandatory evacuation of Hilton Head Island is ordered due to an approaching storm, please go. Evacuating when ordered protects your life and prevents undue risk and burden to first-responders. You might hear someone say, "It's only a Category 1 hurricane." Did you know that since 2010, Category 1 hurricanes have caused 175 deaths and \$103 billion in damage in the U.S. alone?

To receive updates from the PSD in the event of a

hurricane:

- Follow official advisories from the Town of Hilton Head Island Emergency Management, which will contain updates about utility services.
- Follow local news media.

To ensure your household has a safe and adequate water supply after natural disasters take these precautions:

- Store enough drinking water for each family member and pet.
- Store in clean, non-corrosive, tightly covered containers.
- Store containers in a cool, dark location.
- Collect water in bathtubs for non-drinking uses.

Turn off your water meter during an evacuation

Your water can be shut off at the main valve. Everyone in your home should know where this is located. The main valve (usually with a wheel-type handle) is normally located either on the customer side of the meter box or just outside the point where the service line penetrates the foundation of the house.

It will be in line with your water meter, which is usually located near the edge of your property line near the street. The valve can be operated to provide water, if available, for sanitary services only.

□Skip the plastic straw when you can and opt for a reusable straw instead □Reduce waste in your household as much as possible by recycling and repurposing □Reduce water runoff from your lawn to keep chemicals and debris out of our waterways

□ Pick up after your dog

□Organize a group to participate in a litter cleanup program, such as <u>Adopt-A-Highway</u>
