Hurricane season officially began on June 1.

The 2022 Atlantic Hurricane Season officially began on June 1 -and runs through the end of November.

Once again, a more active hurricane season than normal is predicted for this

year. We've already had our first named storm: Tropical Storm Alex.

As the season continues, make sure you're prepared with emergency supplies and know what to do if a hurricane does head our way.

Some preparations you should make now include:

• Creating a hurricane or emergency kit with enough food & water to last

each person and pet at least 3 days, plus flashlights, batteries and first aid supplies/medicine

- Knowing how to turn off your home's water supply and power
- Learn how to properly store safe drinking water

Please limit water use for irrigation as we move into summer

It's only the beginning of May, and Hilton Head Island has already been staying pretty consistently in the 80s for weeks now. And there's still just over a month until it's officially summer!

Make sure you're not wasting water as the heat continues to ramp up.

Please remember to follow Hilton Head's local ordinance by only watering your lawn twice per week — and making sure your irrigation system has a working rain gauge! Hurricane season is here. Make sure you're prepared.

- Single family homes with oddnumbered addresses irrigate on Wednesdays and Sundays only.
- Commercial buildings irrigate on Mondays and Thursdays only.

Did you know the PSD recycles more than 1 billion gallons of wastewater per year?

Now's the time of year that we are particularly grateful for this recycled water program.

As the summer heat continues, we have recycled water to use for irrigation on several of the island's golf courses and to replenish some of the island's wetlands —

which are vital habitats for a variety of wildlife.

And we can do all of this without depleting the island's drinking water supply!

Our recycled water wetlands also had some unique visitors recently.

The PSD's General Manager Pete Nardi noticed these Black-Bellied Whistling Ducks at the Whooping Crane Pond Conservancy.

These ducks are a relatively new species for Hilton Head Island and the South Carolina coast — they've been migrating from the Western U.S.

First, please make sure you're only watering your lawn twice a week, either in the early morning or after dark, and make sure you irrigation controller has a working rain gauge.

Take shorter (and colder) showers to save water AND energy.
