Hilton Head PSD's Hickman earns World Water Skills honors for U.S. team

Hilton Head PSD Water Quality Supervisor Sarah Hickman recently represented the United States and earned top event and medalist honors in the World Water Skills Competition at IFAT Munich (GER), the world's leading trade fair for environmental technologies.

Hickman and teammate Lindie Aragon, of Westminster, CO, represented the United States on behalf of the Water Environment Federation (WEF) and were sponsored by Empowering Pumps & Equipment. In the competition, 27 teams showcased their professional skills in six different categories, including Wastewater Process Control, Laboratory Analysis, Pump Maintenance and Work Safety/Confined Space Entry. Hickman and Aragon finished 1st in the Process Control event and received the silver medal for overall performance in the Wastewater Professionals category.

"It was an amazing experience to compete against, interact with, and learn from so many excellent environmental professionals from around the world," said Hickman. "I'm glad I could represent the U.S.A. and Hilton Head PSD while I was there! We thank WEF, our sponsor, and our colleagues for supporting our team." Hickman earlier this spring earned the Water Environment Association of South Carolina's Crystal Crucible Award, which recognizes significant contributions among those working in water and wastewater analysis. Hickman supervises the PSD's Water Quality Laboratory. She has volunteered for many years to compete in, organize, and judge the WEASC's Operations Challenge competitions, where wastewater professionals compete as teams in various industry-related categories, including pipe repair, treatment process controls, confined space rescue, laboratory, and pump maintenance.

Hilton Head PSD Commission candidate filing notice

The Hilton Head Public Service District (PSD) Commission will have four seats up for election during the general election on Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2024. One seat each in PSD Voting Districts 2, 3, 4, and 6, will be up for election. Commissioners are elected to four-year terms.

The filing period begins July 15 and ends at noon on August 15. All candidates must reside in and be currently registered to vote in the PSD Voting District for which they

are seeking office. Candidates' voter registration must match their current residence at the time of the election.

Citizens who are interested in filing for candidacy must do so in person at the PSD Customer Service Center at 21 Oak Park Drive off Mathews Drive, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, by arranging to sign the Statement of Intention of Candidacy – Nonpartisan form in the presence of the PSD's General Manager or authorized representative. The filing form is available at the PSD or may be downloaded from the <u>S.C. Election Commission website here.</u>

Each candidate must file an S.C. Ethics Commission Statement of Economic Interest and Campaign Disclosure forms by using the <u>electronic filing system here</u>. These forms do not need to be done prior to or at filing but must be completed in a timely fashion based on the State's requirements.

The ASR well annually stores and distributes approximately 260 million gallons of water to help the PSD meet peak-season water demands. The River Basin Council, which includes PSD General Manager Pete Nardi, is part of the South Carolina State Water Plan initiative to determine water capacity needs throughout the state.



Hilton Head PSD in May hosted a free Carolina Yards workshop led by Ellen Sturup Comeau, Clemson Cooperative Extension Water Resources Agent.

Hurricane Season Has Begun

Make sure your emergency kit is stocked & you have a hurricane plan in place!



The Atlantic Hurricane Season Runs June 1 through November 30

Now that hurricane season has officially begun, it's extra important to stay prepared.

There are many different ways you can prepare now in case a storm does head our way this season:

- Keep a stocked hurricane kit that includes food & water to last at least 3 days, a first aid kit, personal hygiene items, flash lights and other emergency items. You can find a comprehensive list <u>here</u>.
- Make sure you're properly storing drinking water in clean, non-corrosive, tightly covered containers and keep those containers in a cool, dark location.
- Know how to prepare your home. This should include knowing where your water shut-off valve is located, how to protect your water heater, and having supplies like sandbags, plywood or storm shutters ready to go.
- Make a plan! If a hurricane does head for our area, you'll need to know your <u>zone</u> and <u>evacuation routes</u> in case a mandatory evacuation is ordered.
- Prepare a "go bag" to grab in case of an evacuation. This should include any

important documents (birth certificates, etc.), prescription medications, glasses or contacts, toiletries, a change of clothes or two, and any comfort items you'd like to have with you (or have for a child or family member).

Make sure to follow local officials in the event a storm does head our way. To keep up with hurricane forecasts, follow the National Hurricane Center on social media and see daily updated forecasts on their website, <u>nhc.noaa.gov</u>.



Don't forget about your pets when making your hurricane plan!

Your emergency kit should include your pets' needs as well — food, water, any medications and maybe a few comfort items like a blanket or toy.

Your "go-bag" should include your pets' paperwork (especially vaccination records) with your important paperwork!

You should also make sure you have an evacuation plan in place that includes your pets, as most storm shelters that open in our area do not allow pets.

Research pet-friendly hotels ahead of time or plan to stay with a friend or family member. Hotels are not required to allow pets during an evacuation, though many pet-friendly hotels will waive their pet fees.

The South Carolina Emergency Management Division has a guide for making an emergency plan that involves your pets <u>here</u>.

Lowcountry Community Indicators

The Lowcountry region—Beaufort, Colleton, Hampton, and Jasper Counties —experienced unprecedented growth, development, and change between 1990 and 2005. Between 2007 and 2010, a nationwide economic downturn negatively affected the region. Since 2011, the regional economy has shown signs of continuously rebounding. There is a great deal of quantitative information and data available that both confirms and explains what has taken place.

To continue monitoring and evaluating the state of the Lowcountry region,

the Lowcountry Community Indicators (LCI) Project was initiated. The LCI consolidates the Community Foundation of the Lowcountry's <u>Community</u> <u>Indicators Report</u> and the Lowcountry Council of Governments' <u>the People</u> <u>and the Economy Report</u>. These two reports are complementary, providing common criteria and metrics related to the Lowcountry region.

The main objective of the LCI is to provide a centralized community resource offering relevant indicators that help support informed decisionmaking. The LCI will assist citizen leaders, public officials and policy makers, nonprofit organizations, businesses, researchers, and the media in making decisions to positively affect the community's well-being.

The LCI offers key indicators for the region that are understandable, meaningful, and accessible through its

website <u>www.lowcountrycommunityindicators.org.</u> The website allows users to view, navigate to, and download specific, relevant indicators of each topic mentioned above. In addition, the user will have the ability to locate all the data for one specific county or compare the data for all four counties.
