

PSD Water Quality Lab earns Laboratory of Excellence

Hilton Head Public Service District's (PSD) Water Quality Laboratory has once again

been recognized as a Laboratory of Excellence as part of its annual certification by the S.C. Department of Environmental Services. The independent agency that conducts the certification recognized the PSD lab "achieving 100% acceptable data" in a group of 380 participating labs, according to a statement from the independent agency. "This achievement is a demonstration of the superior quality of the laboratory," according to the statement. The PSD Water Quality Laboratory conducts thousands of tests annually on the quality of our tap water and treated recycled water. It is led by Water Quality Supervisor Sarah Hickman.

"The PSD's commitment to providing clean drinking water to our customers and protecting and enhancing the island's ecosystems through our recycled water program is aided by and demonstrated through continuous scientific analyses," said PSD General Manager Pete Nardi. "The Laboratory of Excellence recognition for our PSD Water Quality Laboratory under Sarah Hickman's outstanding guidance confirms our dedication to achieving our mission."

It's time for a #SprinklerSpruceUp.



Your irrigation system labored all summer long to keep your landscape lush.

Show it a little TLC as we approach fall and inspect, connect, direct, and select your way to water efficiency with a sprinkler spruce-up:

Inspect

Inspect your sprinkler system for breaks and leaks! Look for sprinkler heads that do not pop up fully or are tilted. If you find a broken sprinkler head or leak, place a flag so you can fix it later or show a professional where a fix is needed!

Connect

Connect sprinklers, pipes and valves. Leaks can occur at the joints between sprinklers and the piping. Leaking joints can also be a sign of too much water pressure or particles in the water. Between irrigation cycles, look for areas of the landscape with water pooling on the surface; that could be a sign of an underground leak. Check the connections inside valve boxes to make sure all the valves and other components are securely connected and that the valves can shut. If the valves are not able to close completely, your system could slowly seep water even when it is turned off.

Direct

Direct sprinklers for best water coverage. Make sure you aren't watering sidewalks, roads, or driveways.

Select

For extra water savings, select a WaterSense-labeled irrigation controller.

Lowcountry Community Indicators

The Lowcountry region—Beaufort, Colleton, Hampton, and Jasper Counties —experienced unprecedented growth, development, and change between 1990 and 2005. Between 2007 and 2010, a nationwide economic downturn negatively affected the region. Since 2011, the regional economy has shown signs of continuously rebounding. There is a great deal of quantitative information and data available that both confirms and explains what has taken place.

To continue monitoring and evaluating the state of the Lowcountry region, the Lowcountry Community Indicators (LCI) Project was initiated. The LCI consolidates the Community Foundation of the Lowcountry's <u>Community</u> <u>Indicators Report</u> and the Lowcountry Council of Governments' <u>the People</u> <u>and the Economy Report</u>. These two reports are complementary, providing common criteria and metrics related to the Lowcountry region.

The main objective of the LCI is to provide a centralized community

resource offering relevant indicators that help support informed decisionmaking. The LCI will assist citizen leaders, public officials and policy makers, nonprofit organizations, businesses, researchers, and the media in making decisions to positively affect the community's well-being.

The LCI offers key indicators for the region that are understandable, meaningful, and accessible through its

website <u>www.lowcountrycommunityindicators.org</u>. The website allows users to view, navigate to, and download specific, relevant indicators of each topic mentioned above. In addition, the user will have the ability to locate all the data for one specific county or compare the data for all four counties.
